IMPORTANT PLANNING NOTES

1. ECON 101 and ECON 102 can be used to satisfy the Social Sciences core requirements of a Bachelor of Arts or Bachelor of Science degree, or the Arts core requirements in a B.Sc. degree.
2. Students are required to research and meet the prerequisites for every senior-level ECON course they take as part of their degree. STAT 151 and MATH 114 are common prerequisites for senior-level ECON courses and will benefit students studying Economics. However, students may not require them depending upon the senior-level courses they choose. STAT 151 and MATH 114 can be used to satisfy the Analytical Studies core requirement of a BA degree.
3. Students may use equivalent courses, including STAT 141 or STAT 152 and MATH 113, to meet these requirements.
4. See the reverse side of this sheet for a listing of Economics courses offered at MacEwan University. Please keep in mind that course offerings will vary from academic year to academic year. Student may address questions about planned course offerings to the Economics discipline chair or the Faculty of Arts and Science Program Services Office.
