IMPORTANT PLANNING NOTES

- A student's 6CR of junior-level English, combined with their 6CR in a Language Other than English (LOE), can be used to fulfill the 12CR Language and Literacy core requirements of the Bachelor of Arts degree. LOE credits can also be used to meet the International Content exit requirement for the BA degree. Exit requirements are the *only* time a student can use a course as duplicate credit.
- The 3CR in Canadian Literature taken toward a student's English major can also be used to meet the Canadian Content exit requirement for the BA degree. Canadian Literature courses are not bolded and are italicized in the list below. Exit requirements are the **only** time a student can use a course as duplicate credit.
- 3. A student's exit requirement of 3CR in Canadian Literature may be fulfilled with the same course as their 3CR in British, American, Canadian or Post-Colonial literatures from the 20th and 21st centuries.
- 4. Equivalent courses may be used to meet this requirement, including previously offered ENGL 100 (6CR), 101 (6CR) and 105 (6CR).
- 5. Students who have previously taken ENGL 267 will be permitted to use that course to fulfill their Literary Theory requirement. Alternately, ENGL 267 may be used as a prerequisite for the new Literary Theory courses. The prerequisite for each of ENGL 391, 392, 393, and 394 is one of ENGL 267, 282, 283, 284, 285 or 286. These 200-level, 3CR courses are considered genre courses.
- See below for a listing of English courses offered at MacEwan University. Please keep in mind that course offerings will vary from academic year to academic year. Student may address questions about planned course offerings to the English discipline chair or the Faculty of Arts and Science Program Services Office.
- 7. Courses that have been renumbered from 200-level to 300-level will be counted toward a student's major as the level they were numbered at the time when the student took the course.
