DECLARATION PROCESS				
The Arts Psychology major is a competitive major. Students must complete PSYC 104, PSYC 105, and one 200-level PSYC course, not including PSYC 212. Students must also be finished or enrolled in PSYC 212.				
The number of new seats available in the Arts Psychology major will be determined by the Psychology department annually. Students will submit their declaration by the Winter term add/drop deadline (the second Friday in January). Students who apply will be ranked by their admissions GPA, which is calculated using their most recent 24 credits of university-level course work, without breaking up a term. The applicants with the highest GPA will be admitted to the program first, until no seats remain. Students will be notified of the success or denial of their application to the Arts Psychology major no later than February 1.
