

Applying at the Port of Entry (Land Border or Airport)



You may apply for a study permit at the Port of Entry if you are a:

- U.S citizen
- U.S. permanent resident
- Person who has lawfully been admitted to the U.S. for permanent residence
- Resident of Greenland
- Resident of Saint-Pierre and Miquelon

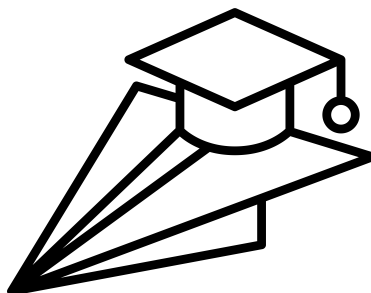


Note: U.S. citizens are exempt from the eTA requirement and must carry proper identification, such as a valid U.S. passport. Lawful permanent residents of the United States who hold valid status in the U.S. are exempt from the eTA requirement. They must carry official proof of status (or an equivalent status document) and a valid passport from their country of nationality (or an equivalent travel document). More information [here](#).

Biometrics



U.S. Permanent Residents may be required to provide biometrics when applying for their temporary resident documents. U.S. citizens are currently exempt from the biometrics requirement. For more information, see [Immigration Canada's website](#).



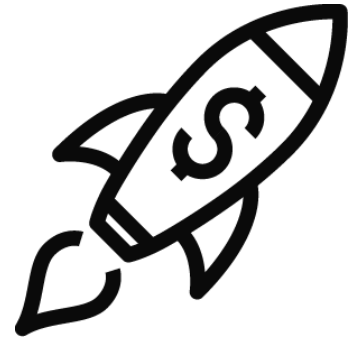
Required Documents



Ensure you have [all the necessary documents](#) to apply for a study permit at the POE. You will need to bring with you:

- Your valid passport
- Recent proof of your financial capacity to pay for your tuition and fees and living expenses for one year of studies (If your parents are paying for your tuition and living expenses, include a letter of support) and a copy of your birth certificate
- Your MacEwan IRCC Letter of Acceptance
- A [term enrollment and account summary](#) (available in myStudentSystem)
- Your Provincial Attestation Letter (PAL)
- The processing fee of \$150 CAD (CAD or U.S. cash, debit, or credit card accepted)
- Fees for biometrics (if applicable)
- Evidence of Work Requirement in Study/Co-Op Letter (if applicable)
- If your program of study has a Co-op/clinical placement in healthcare, childcare, or is related to working with youth or the elderly, you will need to provide the proof of undergoing an [Immigration Medical Exam \(IME\)](#)
- If you are a minor (under 17 years of age), copies of your custodianship documents





Proof of Financial Capacity

The CBSA officer may ask you to prove that you have the funds to cover your tuition and fees and living expenses for one year of studies. If you will be completing your studies in less than one year, you must demonstrate that you have the funds to cover the remainder of your studies and stay in Canada.

Examples of proof of financial capacity include:

- Your 4 most recent bank statements and/or a recent bank letter stating your current balance
- The 4 most recent bank statements and/or recent bank letters stating the current balance of the bank account(s) belonging to the person(s) paying your tuition and living expenses, accompanied by a letter from the person(s) and a copy of their ID
- Proof of financial aid, scholarships, stipends, etc.
- Proof of payment of MacEwan tuition and related fees
- Proof of payment of MacEwan residence fees (if applicable)
